Residential Tenancies Act



The RTA was an important piece of legislation to secure the rights of renters but proved very contentious with landowners facing off against renters in an ideological battle of what role housing plays \bigcirc \bigcirc We ran a submission party to get students to submit on the bill and got over 50 submissions (and awful flatting stories). Michael Turnbull (Welfare VP) and I also wrote the VUWSA submission on the legislation then did an oral submission on the Act.


I helped to coordinate the response of VUWSA for the hall rent strike, and helped



Grade Bump


I worked with Taylah to help coordinate the response of VUWSA to the issue of grade bump and parity between universities. When the University refused to give students a grade bump (despite universities such as Auckland and Otago doing so), coupled with the University's inability to communicate effectively with students, rightfully caused an uproar. After the trimester 1 we had, it was the least university could do (and they didn't ^(C)). I liased with the organisers – Lachlan Craig and Ella Childs – to work out a plan, communications, and strategy. We set up a petition that got 7000 signatures, and was on the news! The university did not listen to its students sadly, but in the end we did get some form of parity.

However, it is fair to say the university demonstrated poor communication, poor collaboration, and little respect for the student body during this.



• NZUSA

I worked with NZUSA on a couple of things throughout COVID-19. The first was a student skill share, which unfortunately didn't get to pop off due to other factors, but it was a great idea if we just had more time. The second was about their campaign around student financial welfare. I coordinated and communicated between VUWSA and NZUSA to help provide support for this campaign.



General Election



One of my main goals this year was around the upcoming GENERAL ELECTION!!! 😳 We have been working on this since retreat. At retreat, we decided that this campaign would be a two-

pronged campaign – one based on enrolling people to vote, and the other based on issues that we'd like students to think about when deciding who to vote for. We also brainstormed ideas of enrolling students that worked outside of the traditional bounds. This included: enrolling people at the weekend vegetable markets, enrolling people at gigs, and having enrollment parties.

We began our activations during O-Week, where we held sausage sizzles and asked students what issues they were most concerned about. In March, we then had our consulting potluck where we brought together the rep groups and talked about what change we'd like to see in the world, and how that would be influencing our choices of who to vote for in the 2020 General Elections. From these, we wrote up our policy demands, of what issues were important to students. These focused on four categories: mental health, cost of living and poverty, housing, and climate change.

The exec also debated whether it was important to take a stance on the two referendums that would be voted on this year. While VUWSA had already decided to take a stance on the Cannabis Legalisation and Control Bill, the issue of taking a stance on the End of Life Choice Act was more contentious. In the end, we decided to provide resources and educate, but not necessarily promote our vote for a certain way.

We also decided that it would be useful to connect with a number of groups to see how we could all work together in increasing the youth vote. These groups included the Electoral Commission, and NZUSA. We also contacted MAWSA, the student association at Massey Wellington to see if there was potential for collaborations there.

We also secured \$25,000 worth of funding from the VUWSA trust for this campaign! Thank you to Ralph, our Treasurer-Secretary for helping us with our proposal to get this funding. We plan

to use this funding to kick things off with enrolment drives, panel debates and discussions in Trimester 2, in order to carry out this campaign!

Planning 4 Growth


Since around March I have had Planning 4 Growth in the back of my mind and have been planning for it since. Planning 4 Growth is the Wellington City Council's 30-year plan that deals most with zoning in order to adapt to future growth. Unfortunately, due to COVID-19 the submission process had been postponed a few times, but this meant more time for us to consult with the community and encourage submissions. Yet again, this is another contentious piece of legislation! It promotes removing red tape around developing new housing, and removing heritage status from some buildings and areas. This is important as one of the main issues we face in Wellington is a lack of housing, and shitty old housing, so this spatial plan would make a large difference in our lives. I have met up with some groups and have been planning submission parties and campaign strategy since March.

SFSW

Stress Free Study Week (SFSW) looked a little different this year, due to the university replacing exams with assessments, and to COVID health and safety precautions, we decided to only have fruit, cereal, coffee and tea available on a serve yourself basis during SFSW. Engagement was still high, which was good!
